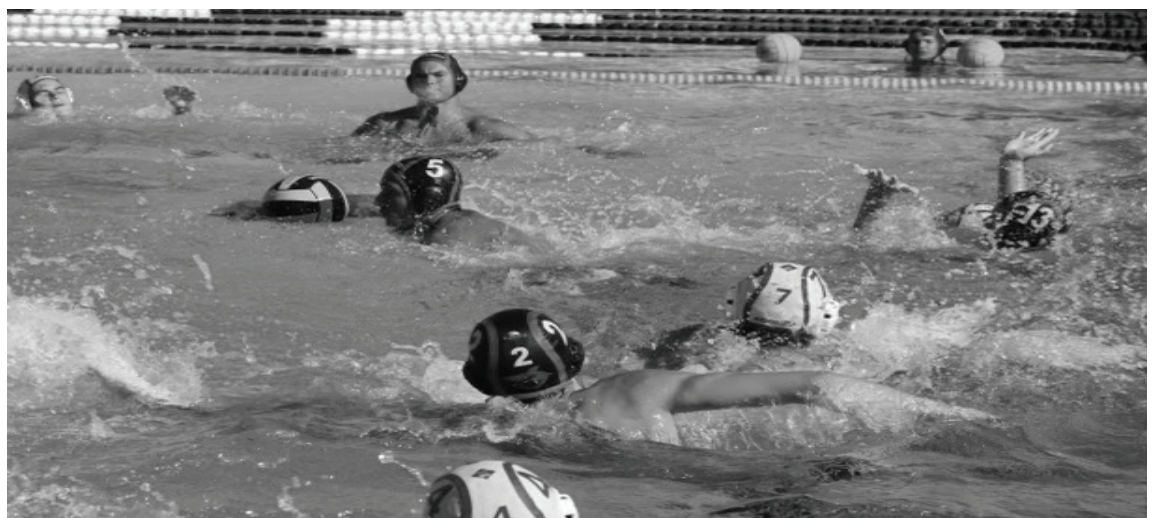
MALIBU WATER POLO IS BACK

RAMIFICATIONS OF A SHRINKING STUDENT POPULATION

For the past few years the talk of the declining enrolment rate has been circulating around the school. Whether or not you've noticed class sizes become smaller, it is undoubtedly a big concern.

Around 2007 there were somewhere between 800-900 kids enrolled in Malibu High School and now there are 430 which has caused class sizes to drop in half from 200-225 students to 100-125 students. This trend shows that each year the amount of students enrolled in the school becomes less and less. Another example of this can be seen by the graduating class of 2021 only having 147 students and the incoming 6th-grade class only having a small enrollment of 67 kids.

Although the problem isn't students leaving the school, because only about 6% leave to go to other schools such as Oaks Chrstrans, Viewpoint and Cross

Roads. The problem is the fact that the population of Malibu itself is dropping. Malibu's population went from around 13,000 to 10,000 in the last 3 years. An issue that contributes to the small population is that not a lot of families, with kids, are moving into Malibu, due to the fact that housing is not affordable and real estate prices are hitting an all time high. People think of Malibu when buying vacation homes, not necessarily to raise their kids.

The biggest threat of the declining enrollment is the reduction of staff in the school. Classes are supposed to be 35 students per teacher, a benchmark that our school fails to meet. Luckily, the district has been letting this slide for now. If we do have to end up getting rid of teachers it will be by seniority. Meaning that we might have to get rid of teachers that we love, one being Ms. Stowell, "I'm one of the

last english teachers hired at this school, so if staffing was reduced I would probably be one of the first ones transferred to Santa Monica Highschool" As teachers go so will their electives that they teach. Mrs. Stowell teaches three electives: at this Shark TV, Journalism and Advanced film. "The electives I offered could probably disappear" is how she responded when I asked her what would happen to these classes.

You may be wondering how the school is going to fix the problem, the answer is that there really isn't much they can do. They hope that the new buildings will attract more students and cause them to enroll. Really all they can do is hope for more students to come in and unless more families start moving to Malibu it's unlikely that will happen. If the trend continues, the school will continue to shrink.

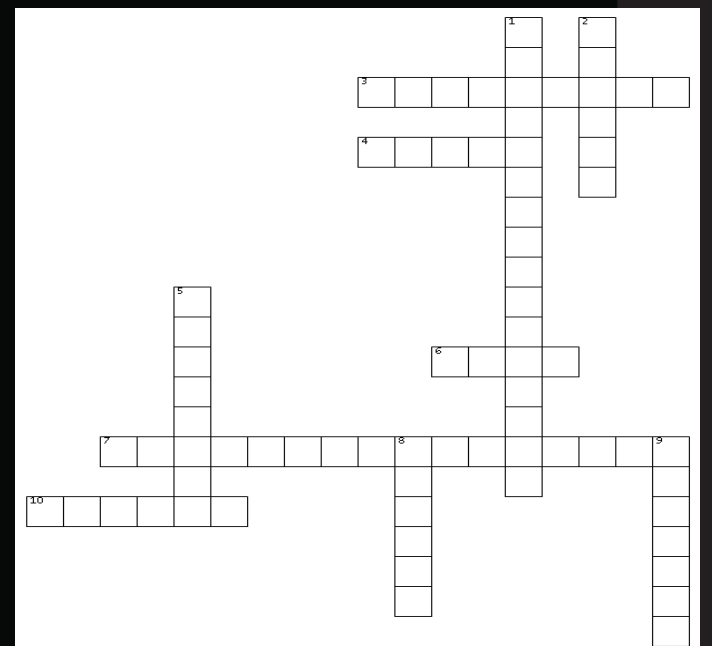

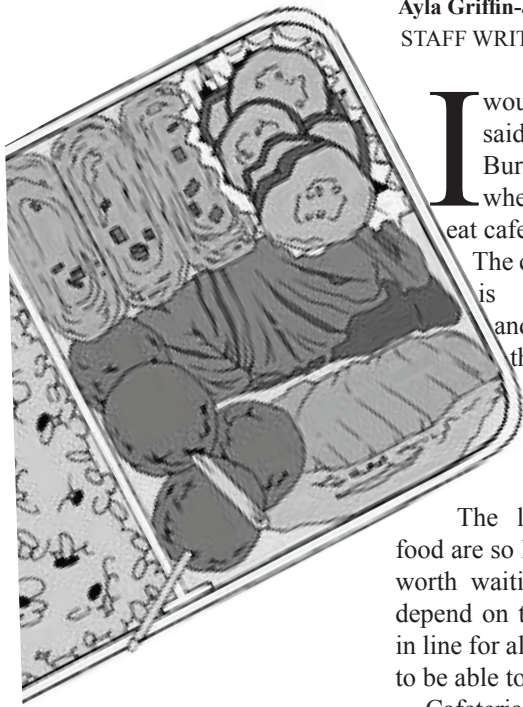

Cafeteria food is cheap, but has no nutritional value, and is simply made to give out as

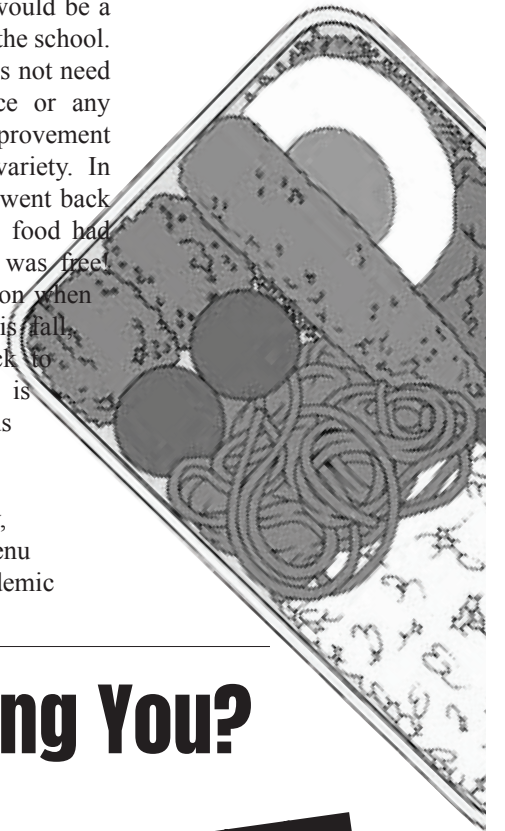

COVID & Math

COVID-19 has negatively impacted student learning across the country in all subjects. Although all subjects are facing a negative impact, Math and subsequently science have faced the worst of the "Covid Slide" or hole in knowledge due to COVID-19. Both students and teachers are feeling the pressure of learning with such difficult circumstances, especially now that classes are picking up again in person.

NWEA, a research-based non-profit organization that creates academic assessments for students up to 12th grade with assessments used in over 9,500 schools and districts in 145 countries, found that math scores have been upwards of 10% lower than years without major disasters. Furthermore, NWEA findings show the English language arts scores were largely the same as previous years.

With nearly all students behind on math, some teachers are really feeling the crunch. Ms. Sekiali, a Malibu High School calculus teacher, describes that she feels

up to half of her students may be behind, but "not that much more behind than previous years," and is more concerned about the transition from online learning to in-person instruction. Similarly, Ms. Smith, another MHS math teacher, says that some students are "struggling to remember the intensity of math" specifically in person. Although pressured by the status of students, Ms. Seikali says she is "prepared for this" and "students are way better than I expected... and most of them are working hard."

Both Ms. Sekiali and Ms. Smith noticed that the differences in the effect of COVID-19 on math skills are very individualized to each student and are different for each math class. For instance, Ms. Smith states that a student behind in a certain topic may be given extra work, and students may have to work a little harder on where their "holes" in knowledge are, stating that students may "have to push a little harder." Ms. Sekali also noted how students are working hard to push through the difficulties of returning to school. Ms. Smith says that what teachers in the math department are looking for is "balance... and the big idea standards." Although some materials may be cut out, students will be prepared for the future.

Although math may be more affected by COVID-19 than other subjects, teachers are confident in their students that they will be

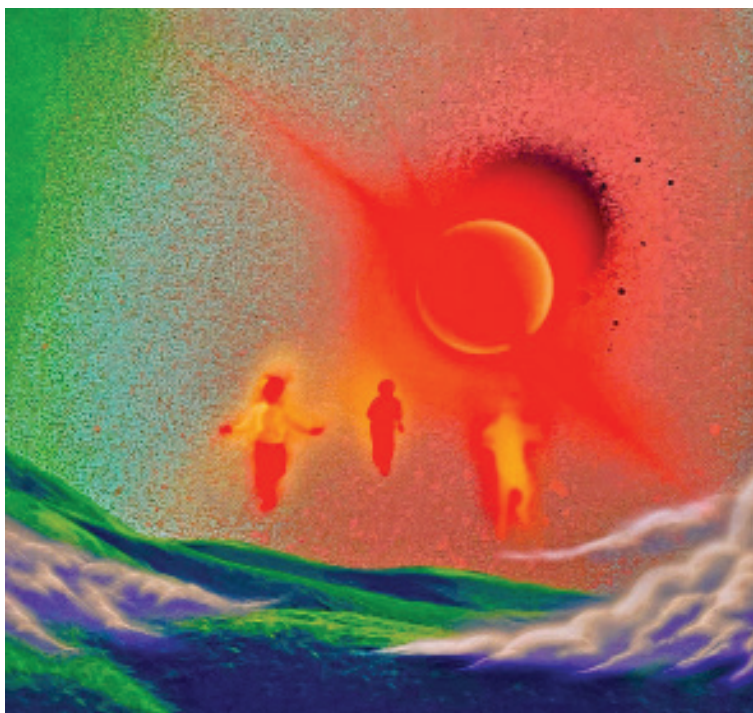
Being one of the most influential and controversial artists of our time, a new album from Kanye West is undoubtedly going to stir up some opinions, but the album *Donda* created an unusual amount of drama.

Ye's 10th studio album was first scheduled to drop July 23rd, the day after his first of three listening events. After several delayed release dates, Universal finally released the album to the public the morning of August 19th. In an Instagram post following *Donda*'s release, West claimed that the record label, Universal Music Group, dropped the album without his permission, but this could very well just be a publicity stunt.

West was able to create a huge amount of hype and publicity around *Donda*, which brought increased expectations and made the release even more controversial. Three different theatrical listening events took place in stadiums across Atlanta and Chicago. These three listening parties increased the excitement around the release of *Donda*. It was also made clear that *Donda* wasn't going to be a typical album. Kanye sent out multiple tweets speculating how good the album would be and how well it would do after its release. A huge amount of excitement was created through social media and other platforms. West's early remarks weren't wrong. *Donda* made the largest debut of the year, opening at number 1 on the Billboard and already producing 357 million plays.

I asked a few of my Kanye West fan friends questions about *Donda*. In Akiva Friedman's opinion he loved the album, saying that, "it was Kanye's best album since the previous few he has released". Although *Donda* was a great success, Akiva said that "It ranks high up but isn't his best album." He also added that he believed it met the hype created around it. Asher, another friend I interviewed said, "the album is actually very good after a couple of listens." But in contrary to Akiva's belief, Asher said that "it didn't meet up to the hype around it". 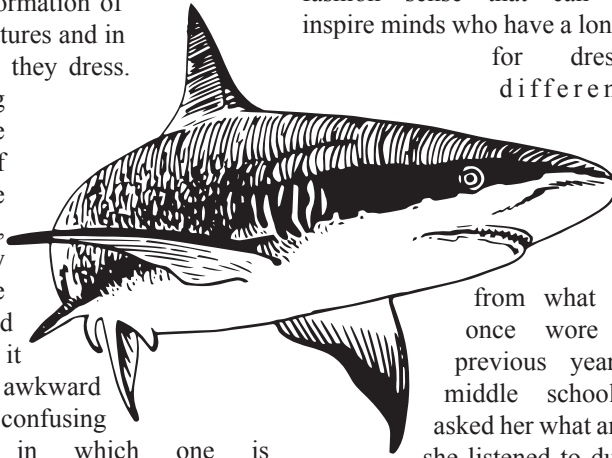
FROM SHARK, TO MINNOW

STOCK MARKET BASICS

The combination of buyers and sellers of stocks (also known as shares) symbolizes ownership claims on companies, and is known as a stock market, equity market, or share market. Stocks that are listed on a public stock exchange, such as shares of private enterprises, “are” sold to investors through equity crowdfunding platforms. Stockbrokers and computerized trading platforms are the most common ways to invest in the stock market. The majority of investments are made with a specific investing strategy in mind. Individual and institutional investors join together in stock markets to buy and sell shares in a public setting, now known as electronic markets and apps. As buyers and sellers place orders, supply and demand in the market determine share prices.

What Are The Different Stock Market Types? There are two types of equity markets: primary and secondary.

The primary stock market, also known as the new issues market, is where securities are originally offered to the public. In this market the new issues are made in following four ways; public issue, rights issue, private placements, and preferential allotment.

Stock exchanges, also known as secondary stock markets, are a significant aspect of the capital market. It is a regulated market for the trading of securities. Governments, semi-government organizations, public institutions, joint stock businesses, and other organizations issue these securities.

Ever since elementary school, the words reduce, reuse, and recycle have been engraved in our heads with hopes of being able to influence younger generations to make a change. But in truth, more than 91% of plastic isn’t recycled, whether that be due to the fact that people are uneducated about what can and can not be recycled, or because it is burned instead of recycled because of the expenses.

According to National Geographic, “Mass production of plastics, which began just six decades ago, has accelerated so rapidly that it has created 8.3 billion metric tons [of plastic]”. As most of us know, plastic takes a long time to completely degrade, more than 400 years, so over 88% of plastic that has ever been produced is still around today.

Living in a town that is surrounded by marine life, plastic directly affects our environment and community. Birds, marine animals, fish, and all sorts of other animals that live on the coastline are put in danger by the amount of plastic and trash that floats around in our oceans. It’s our environment, our beaches, and our surf spots, something that holds importance to many of the residents and tourists here in Malibu.

Roland Geyer, a specialist in the industrial ecology field, explains how different metals and plastics have different decomposition rates. He spoke about how the growing concern is due to “the rapid acceleration of plastic manufacturing, which so far has doubled roughly every 15 years” (National Geographic).

In a study created in 2015, there was an estimated 8 million tons of plastic that flowed into our marine ecosystems. To put this

in perspective, that is about five grocery bags of plastic trash for every foot of coastline around the world. Since plastic was produced so rapidly, controlling the amount of plastic waste wasn’t a thought until it was too late. Now, finding a way to manage all the plastic waste gets more and more complicated by the day, especially since recycling percentages have remained very low throughout the years - around 9% since 2012.

Since the world is drowning in plastic, governments have taken less environmentally friendly measures, throwing plastic in landfills, and causing hundreds of other issues. Plastics contain many harmful chemicals, and when the plastic enters the landfill,

those chemicals seep into the soil, contaminating drinking water, other supplies and streams, and eventually reaching the ocean.

Essentially, China used to buy our plastic and other waste products until 2018, when they shut their doors and prohibited “24 types of waste from entering the country” (theguardian.com). As a result, the price of plastic plummeted, making it, to some, not worth recycling. Instead, most countries have resorted to dumping their waste in illegal dumps within Malaysia. Countries have also resorted to incineration, but this also comes with its harmful effects.

Incineration poses a threat to all life forms, contaminating soil, water, and other life essentials. Burning plastics and other wastes releases pollutants into the air, contributing to the development of asthma, cancer, and hundreds

of other diseases. According to no-burn.org, “Persistent Organic Pollutants travel long distances, and ultimately deposit into the ocean and polar ice caps, where they can adsorb onto other plastic marine debris and microplastics, bioaccumulating up the food chain, threatening marine and human health”.

Adding onto the previous point, since plastic is a petroleum-based material, when it is burned, it releases mass amounts of climate pollution, resulting in “rising sea levels, increased ocean and air toxicity, and destruction of coral reefs and other marine life” (no-burn.org).

In general, the whole concept of recycling has slowly begun to

years, and at a fraction of the cost.

In order to rid the oceans of plastic, people not only need to clean up what is already in the oceans, but also what is entering the oceans by closing the so-called river “tab”.

According to globalowls.com, there is plenty of data on which rivers are the most polluted, therefore making it the best starting point. “The Ocean Cleanup works together with government leaders, individuals, and private corporations to tackle the 1000 most polluting rivers all over the world, in five years from rollout” (globalowls.com).

Another fascinating discovery would be the usefulness of plastic-eating bacteria. All around the world, scientists have been able to discover unique types of bacteria that can decompose and degrade certain types of plastics. In simpler terms, “By secreting an enzyme which “eats” the chemical bonds in the chain, the molecules are broken down into their smaller components, making them easier to be recycled” (immago.com)

As you can see there are plenty of different solutions to the escalating issue, both economical and environmentally friendly. Within our city of Malibu, there are many efforts in order to improve our recycling and ensure that our community does everything it can to help. There are also many other programs that Malibu has in order to help clean up our beaches and support recycling. Recycling plastic is effective when done right, and if done correctly, can pull us out of this climate crisis we are suffering. As much as we hear it, it truly is up to our generation. We have the willpower, the new technological advancements, and enough love for our environment to give back, ensuring that it gets taken care of the same way it benefits and takes care of us.



THE PLAGUE OF NEXTDOOR

In cities like Malibu, where white people make a remarkable predominance in population, the algorithm of Nextdoor amplifies inequality. Nextdoor has a local moderator system that elects neighborhood 'leads' who are granted privileges of moderating and removing any posts or comments that they deem 'harmful' to the Nextdoor environment.

None of these leads have any specific training or qualifications other than the fact they are either prevalent voices on the site, long-time users, or friends who were granted referrals by other leads. This model of amplifying voices comes at the expense of drowning out any minority voices within

these communities and trigger happy moderation privileges that have shown their power.

One of the most - if not THE most - popular topics within Malibu's Nextdoor sector is homelessness. The website creates a 'safe' environment for the wealthy and white to voice their opinions, and people get pretty mask-off when it comes to their dehumanizing rhetoric.

One Malibu Nextdoor user writes, "White privilege? Right. Entitlement ?? Paaaaaaalease... Dbl standards for homeless Start fires, dump trash, no registration, no license... all in prime zones of Malibu. Bum Privilege." while discussing the state of homelessness in the city. Another user calls homeless encampments on Zuma beach 'Kafkaesque', continuing that

"We all know what issues from these encampments aside from criminal stalkers, these untreated human waste fields are dangerous health risks. One could almost observe that the invasion is planned and deliberate."

These comments are the mere tip of the iceberg when it comes to the problematic site, especially considering this is what the aforementioned 'leads' left up. Creating a digitized space exclusive to one of the most inaccessible neighborhoods was always bound to spew apathetic remarks and elitist behavior.

On a broader community scale for Nextdoor, racial profiling has also found a home within the site. In one BuzzFeed news article compiling various cases of profiling, a Bay Area resident justifies their 'suspicion' over a man walking with his child by stating, "Well he was walking on foot and I don't really know what made him suspicious, but he looked like a Cholo. Maybe it was how he was wearing his pants." Another Nextdoor user complained that it "concerned me to see Dreads biking by my house this morning with 3 other less desirables. Sure don't need him with a posse of like minded individuals roaming our neighborhood."

In response to this persistent issue on the platform, Nextdoor has attempted to roll out functions within their algorithm to stop posts that solely focus on a person's race, as well as an update to their community/lead guidelines. But once again, this is where the conflict of neighborhood 'leads' comes to a fault, since as long as these posts work within the interests of random leads nothing will be done.

Nextdoor also unveiled its 'Nextdoor for Public Agencies' app, introducing a new crime monitoring tool that works hand in hand with police departments to optimize law enforcement. For example, posts with images of innocent protestors, or pedestrians, could be employed by law enforcement to make targeted arrests, also leading to users becoming 'watchdogs' with close proximity to police.

Needless to say, predominantly white communities such as Malibu have, and will continue to be plagued with the perversion and detriment of classism and racism. Ultimately, it is a question of how these digitized community spaces amplify the harm that is done.
