What's New: The 2022 World Cup

e've been waiting 4 long years for the 2022 Soccer World @up and it is finally here. The 22nd World Cup running will be held in Qatar making it the first ever World Cup to be held in the Arabic world. 64 games will be played in 28 days in 8 uniquely designed stadiums around the capital of Qatar, Doha. 32 across-the-world teams will fight for a place in the final held on December 18th. Traditionally, the World Cup takes place during the summer month of July, but FIFA reconsidered the dates due to the extreme heat Oatar is known to face. To avoid the 120 degree weather that could cause fatal issues, the dates were moved to November 21st through December 18th. At the moment, 29 out of 209

teams have qualified for the tournament and 3 more games will be held in June to determine the last participants. The 6th-ranked Italy found themselves eliminated in a shocking loss against North Macedonia. But as ex-



pected the reigning champs and the number 3 seed France made it in with high chances of winning. The team presents a strong squad that we saw excel in 2018. Mbappe is joined in the front with Atoine Grizman and Karim Benzema making for an explosive offense. N'Golo Kante and Paul Pogba are holding down the fort in midfield and anchoring the back line is Rapael Varane. Deschamps is there to manage the whole thing and will be bringing back strong strategies and leadership. France may have the capability to repeat history but some teams still have a lot to offer.

As they always do, Brazil made it to the World Cup as well with a 1-0 win over Columbia. Being the number one seed and currently the favorite among top contenders, everyone is expecting a lot from the South Americans. They were also undefeated in the

qualifications and barely even let the ball into their half. Tite, Brazil's head coach has been rebalancing and configuring his team to be at its full potential. With Neymar's unmatched speed and dribbling skills and Vinicius Junior's goal scoring partnership with Benzema, the offense will bring strong assets to the field. The premier league player Fabinho in the midfield and Allison in the goal will keep balls out of the net and at Brazil's feet. There is no doubt Brazil and France will bring on a show but other competitors still have a chance.

Other top contenders include Spain, Argentina, Germany, England and Belgium. These are all teams that could easily make it to the round of 16. Argentina has a strong enough program to beat France with some luck and a good mindset. Germany and Belgium will most likely end up together in a close match. Although Belgium may be ranked No. 2 in the world, Germany's quick transition play style could catch them off guard. Seeing that England made it to Semifinals in 2018 and finals in the 2021 Euro Cup, they have been building up for this tournament and are prepared to win. Spain's new generation in the midfield, Alvaro Morata attacking in the front, and their experienced back line brings in an overall built team. Spain could very well win the World Cup all over again with the right leadership and mindset.

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
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10 ACTIVITIES FOR YOUR SUMMER BUCKETLIST


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Catalina

The closest and best option is "K1 Speed", a franchise with the closest location being in Thousand Oaks. It is relatively new, which means it has a freshly done interior with an advanced arcade and racing seats around the building to sit in. The carts are electric carts but that doesn't mean they are too slow, as they are more than capable of going around turns as fast as possible without losing control. twice the amount that it takes to push the planet over 1.5 degrees C of global heating. The evidence is clear: record high temperatures, droughts, and people who benefit from and further the advancement of global warming are oblivious to warnings that something has to change. The start of 2021 movie, "Don't Look Up" is this exact situation but with a different disaster; a scientist trying to warn people that something horrible is about to happen, but nobody listens, and then they all die. There is no time more vital than the present to allocate our resources and attention to stopping the progression of climate change, and to do so we must listen to those who, like Peter Kalmus and the other scientists at the JP Morgan Chase Bank protest, and change the way we interact with the planet that gives us life.
