s the summer NCAA water polo season is approaching. many recruited freshmen for various college teams are working their way into playing a role for their respective teams. UCLA redshirt freshmen, Hakop Kaplanyan, 18, has been accused of by a female acquaintance.

The incident in question oc-curred on April 2nd, 2013 in a dorm located on the UCLA cam-pus. Kaplanyan was immediately arrested after his female acquaintance made a report to the campus police. Kaplanyan maintains that he and the alleged victim were dating and the sex was consen-For security purposes, the identity of the woman and where she attended school is still unknown.

Soon after his arrest, Kaplanyan was released on \$200,000 bail. Kaplanyan has been suspended from UCLA until further notice. The suspension includes not being able to participate in water polo

"I would love to go back to school.... I miss my coaches, I miss my teammates," said Kaplanyan.

Kaplanyan had a court appearance on April 25th, 2013. At that appearance he found out that the Los Angeles District Attorney's Office had not yet filed formal rape charges against him. The DA is continuing to review the case and has a year to decide whether to charge Kaplanyan or not. On April 26th Kaplyanan and

his attorney met with the officials from UCLA, in regards to his suspension from school. In the meeting, the Dean was presented with a petition signed by 700 students in support of Kaplanyan. Kaplanyan plans to appeal his suspension and hopes to return to UCLA. Along with the petition, friends of Kaplanyan posted a video to YouTube showing their support. According to Kaplanyan's UCLA athletic profile he played water polo at Hoover High School and was a three-time first team All-CIF selection. As a sophomore in 2009 he broke the CIF singleseason record for goals scored in a season with 229.

UCLA. Boston bombing: a country unites in grief

n Monday, April 15th, at 2:50 P.M., two bombs, about one block away from each other and eight seconds apart, exploded during the annual Boston Mara-thon. The eruptions occurred on Boylston Street, approximately 4 hours into the event as a portion of the near-27,000 runners approached the midway line, and it sent debris shooting upwards of 50 yards into the air. The explosions killed three people, injured 264 others, and resulted in the largest regional man-hunt operation in United States history.

Attendees of the 2013 Boston

Marathon, an annual event that has occurred since 1897 on Patriot's Day, witnessed extreme distress and panic after the detonation of two small, homemade explosives. The bombs shot debris directly into and above a

crowd of marathon spectators, injuring hundreds of people along Boylston Street and resulting in three casualties. Following the explosions, race volunteers emergency workers flushed the scene, transforming the surrounding areas into triage treatment centers

By 6:30 P.M, eight-year old Martin Richard was identified as one of the three confirmed casualties. Martin Richard's mother, Denise, was also injured in the explosions and his younger sister Jane lost a leg. Local hospitals were over-whelmed for days with providing emergency care to the hundreds of patients with serious injury, many of whom received amputations.

Police reports say no C-4 or any other high grade materials were found in the devices, suggesting that the packages used in the at-tack were made of crude explosive material. New information from witness testimonies suggests

that the bombers had planned to detonate the bombs on July 4th, but pushed up the date because the bombs were ready earlier than

The days immediately following the explosions carried heavy hearts and pain as the nation searched for the perpetrator. After a 102 hour man-hunt, Dzhokhar Tsarnaev, a 19-year-old student, and his 26-year-old brother, were charged with perpetrating the bombings.

After the Tsarnaevs robbed a convenience store, killed an MIT police officer, and carjacked a Mercedes, the police zeroed in on the brothers. The entirety of Boston went on lockdown. Civilians were advised to stay inside and lock their doors, schools were closed, and public transportation was halted.

In a heated shootout on April 19th Tamerlan Tsarnaev killed and, though Dzhokar was seriously injured, he managed to escape. He was found later by the police and was rushed to a local hospital where he was placed under critical care. By April 21st, he gained consciousness and began to communicate with the police.

Since the day of the explosions, multiple investigations and law suits surrounding the incident have unfolded. Dzhokar and his brother, Tamerlan, moved from Chechnya to the United States ten years ago in 2003. Dzhokar graduated at Cambridge Rindge and Latin School with a scholarship from the City of Cambridge and worked a few years at Harvard as a lifeguard.

Tamerlan Tsarnaev was recently laid to rest on May 9th in a disclosed location outside of Massachusetts. Some see his burial as a conclusion to the Boston bombings, but to others it is only the beginning of a long series of investigations to find the truth

Newtown families get involved in gun control

ecember's massacre in Newtown, Connecticut, has sparked increased controversy over gun control in the United States. Many parents of the victims have been getting involved by demanding, through protests, action and a Congressional vote on a gun control bill.

The Newtown shooting at Sandy Hook Elementary school on December 14, 2012 was a mass murder of 28 people, 20 of which were young children. This tragedy was inflicted by 20 year-old Adam Lanza. At a vigil on December 16, President Barack Obama said he would use "whatever power the office holds" to prevent tragedies like this one from occurring again.

Less than a day after the incident, 100,000 Americans signed a petition on the Obama administration's website in support of spurring the national debate on gun control. After the president claimed in a speech that he would make gun control a "central issue" in his next term, citizens' fear of gun restrictions led to a huge increase in the sales of guns, ammunition, and magazines.

Recently, President Obama asked the mother of a six-year-old boy who was killed in the massa-

cre to stand in for him and address the nation. The woman, Francine Wheeler, lost her son Ben and believes that actions should be taken to combat gun violence.

On the president's weekly radio and internet address, Wheeler made a personal plea for people to "do something before our tragedy becomes your tragedy." Francine Wheeler, along with other family members of victims, has launched an effort to push a gun control bill through to Congress. Obama made his case for action by helping the family members meet with senators.

Gun rights activists have made several arguments about the involvement of the families with the debate over gun control. When gun control advocates cite the families' desires, some say it constitutes "using the families." Last week, Senator Rand Paul accused the Obama administration of using the families of Newtown victims as "props."

The country remains divided over whether or not guns should be illegal. Although parents and family members of the Newtown Massacre victims are putting in a strong effort to demand a vote on gun control, the parents are speaking out and saying that they know their role in this debate is the result of the murders of their children.



North Korea

settled in the relationship between North Korea and the rest of the world after a rise in tensions last month. Last April, the Communist country repeat-edly threatened both South Korea and the United States. The bellicose rhetoric followed a nuclear test in February. It is believed the test was part of North Korea's annual celebration of their military. The UN has responded to these tests through additional sanctions, which they believe will slow down North Korean weaponization. Obama spoke about North Korean leader Kim Jung-un, whose motivations have been scrutinized since the latest escalation of threats. "You know, based on our current intelligence assessments, we do not think that they have that capacity, [to launch nuclear strikes against the US]" Obama told NBC News, "But...we have to make sure that we are dealing with every contingency out there. And that is why I have repositioned missile defense systems to guard against any miscalculation on their part.' Despite hostilities dying down, in mid-May North Korea tested six short-range missiles in the span of three days. The main apprehen-sion about North Korea's military capabilities is their ownership of musudans, medium range mis-siles that could potentially reach American bases in Guam. While North Korea moved the missiles from a potential launch site at the coast at the beginning of May, they still remain a concern.

"The idea of Doritos Tacos is great. The supplier [Taco Bell] however, cannot be trusted," said sophomore and food guru Kevin


The Cool Ranch Doritos Locos Tacos were announced to be available to taco fans everywhere on March 7, 2013. The countdown had begun.

4TH OF JULY CAKE RECIPE

ummer is just around the corner, and with it comes the patriotic holiday of the year: the 4th of July. BBQs, beach parties, sun, and glorious flag cake provide a much needed taste of the blissful summer months to come. This flag cake can be made and drooled over on patriotic holidays this summer and can serve at least 30 of your hungriest friends and family, making it perfect for summer parties. Make sure to read the recipe in advance and remember to set out all the ingredients that need to be prepared at room temperature. This cake will be a wonderful addition to any 4th of July festivities.

FLAG CAKE

Adapted from Ina Garten, 2002 Barefoot Contessa

Cake:

- 18 tablespoons (2 1/4 sticks) unsalted butter (at room temperature)
- 3 cups sugar
- 6 large eggs (at room temperature)
- 1 cup sour cream (at room temperature)
- 1 ½ teaspoons vanilla extract
- 3 cups flour
- 1/3 cup cornstarch
- 1 teaspoon kosher salt
- 1 teaspoon baking soda

Icing:

- 1 pound (4 sticks) unsalted butter (at room temperature)
- 1 ½ pounds cream cheese (at room temperature)
- 1 pound confectioners' sugar
- 1 1/2 teaspoons pure vanilla extract

Decoration:

- 2 half-pints blueberries
- 3 half-pints raspberries

Cake:

Heat the oven to 350°F. Butter an 18 x 13 x 1 ½ inch sheet pan.

Cream the butter and sugar in an electric mixer on high speed until light and fluffy. Lower the speed to the medium speed and add 2 eggs at a time, then add the sour cream and vanilla. Scrape down the sides of the bowl and stir until smooth.


Sift the flour, cornstarch, salt, and baking soda together in a bowl. With the electric mixer on low speed, add the flour mixture to the butter mixture until combined. Pour into the prepared pan. Smooth and even the top of the batter with a spatula. Bake in the oven for 20 to 30 minutes, until a toothpick comes out clean. Cool until it is at room temperature.

Icing:

Sift the powdered sugar. Combine the room temperature butter, cream cheese, sifted sugar, and vanilla in the bowl of an electric mixer fitted with the paddle attachment. Mix just until

Assemble:

Spread about three-fourths of the icing on the top of the cooled sheet cake. With a toothpick, sketch the outline of the flag on the iced cake. Neatly fill the upper left corner with blueberries. Place 2 rows of raspberries across the top of the cake as the first red stripe. Put the remaining icing in a pastry bag fitted with a star tip and pipe two rows of white stripes below the raspberries. Alternate rows of raspberries and icing until the flag is complete. Pipe stars on top of the blueberries. The American flag has 50 stars and 13 stripes, but you may find it difficult to create an exact representation of the flag. I find it much easier to use the original colonial flag. Serve the cake in the pan. If you want to serve the cake on a more festive dish, line the bottom of sheet pan with parchment paper when you butter and flour the sheet pan and turn the cake onto the preferred dish before icing and decorating.



The unique set of the play was very minimalist and only had three platforms with extensive lighting.





Block: the first year

or a new kid on the Block, first impressions are important. The arrival of Jerry Block from Oak Park High School was, and still is, a big change for all returning students- as most have never had anyone else aside from Dr. Kelly as their principal.

Mr. Block has had an interesting first year as our principal. There have been positive changes as well as challenges that he has had to overcome. And it is the choices he has made that have left students and faculty still contemplating the relationship they have built over this year.

Varied opinions on Mr. Block and his administration have surfaced. Some members of the community feel that he has done a great job of running the school his first year. According to WASC, Mr. Block has even been noted as, "a visionary leader". However, others feel that Block's administration has been uncommunicative and is often inconsistent on enforcement of school policies.

Many teachers have encountered selective policy enforcement: several members of faculty have gone to Block with virtually identical requests pertaining to health and family, only to receive what one anonymous teacher described simply as "different responses." Another anonymous source said

"[Block] seems to be selective in who he's reprimanding...He's selectively started to enforce rules but he has not announced which rules he's enforcing, and he hasn't made it clear what, if anything, has changed." A general lack of clarity and consistency has been one of the most frequent criticisms of Mr. Block by teachers.

Another significant event in Block's first year has been the conflict pertaining to AP testing. There has been controversy about forcing students to take a costly test (\$90) in order to receive the grade they earned in the class.

According to the Education Code of California, section 49011 (a), "a pupil enrolled in a public school should not be required to pay a pupil fee for participation in an educational activity." At this school, that means that you cannot legally make a student pay for a test in order to receive a grade. However, this is exactly what the

school has been doing, and continued to do this year.

This year, the issue was formally discussed for the first time, and appeared to conclude peacefully with Block's approval and an email stating that teachers should offer an alternate test to pass the class instead. This was the first year in which students were not required to take and pay for an AP test, an illegal practice that had been happening for years without being addressed

However, when it came to the actual enforcement of the new policy, some teachers ignored his position, without evident reper-cussion. While Mr. Block said that teachers should not count mock AP tests for a grade, teacher John Cary stated in an email to students that, for those who chose not to take the AP test, " The mock exam will count as a grade." This e-mail was forwarded by teachers to Block, but when asked about the situation, Block responded "I don't know [about

Cary's email]".

Despite several instances of teachers disregarding the stated AP policy, no evident action has been taken by the administration to remedy these actions. As a result of these inconsistent policies on AP testing, many students were frustrated and confused. Though some had planned on opting out of AP testing, many ultimately took these tests, with some bringing in money the day of the test.

It is inconsistent policy enforce-ment such as this that has contrib-uted to strained relations between Mr. Block and certain members of his staff. Out of the seven teachers interviewed, only three would go on the record to speak about

"Everyone's feeling a little para-noid, let's put it that way," said an anonymous teacher.

Some teachers feel that Mr. Block is not listening. Several anonymous teachers have alluded to the fact that when presented with ideas, Mr. Block will concede, but then fail to follow

"He has the language that it's a democracy... we say various things we want to happen, and then he more-or-less seems to ignore it," said another anonymous

In response to the apparent uneasiness of some of the staff, Block stated that "we need to talk to each other, not about each

This year, Block has been con-

fronted with difficult situations. One such situation, which occurred earlier this year, was the replacement of a controversial long-term French substitute.

According to one anonymous French student, the substitute "tried to be an insane disciplinarian but had no disciplinary skills." The same student went on to say "I don't think she's qualified to even be a teacher and was really overwhelmed."

When this student brought complaints to Mr. Block he responded with what this student described as "Block's standard remark" which is "I need to get back to you on this" Despite a campaign by students and parents to remove the substitute. Block remained reluctant to do so. According to an anonymous teacher, Block "knew there was another option [for a teacher to teach the class] but said there weren't any other options to parents."

"He knowingly misled parents" the teacher said "he handled that one so unbelievably poorly."

Some time after this, the entire class witnessed their substitute, start to collect her things only to be interrupted by Mr. Block who allegedly told her "'I'm gonna need you to leave, I thought I made myself very clear this morning." After this incident, the substitute was replaced.

Although there has been trepidation among faculty, there are those that have gone on the record with nothing but laudatory words for the new principal. "I think he's the best princi-

pal we've had since the school started," said teacher John Cary. Cary also went on to say that "all the changes [Block] has done for the school has, in general, been

Among the changes instituted this year by Mr. Block, there have been positive aspects. The new Robotics Club has been flourishing under Mr. Block's guidance, and there is a strong possibility of new courses for the upcoming years.

However, although it is nice to see a school looking great on paper, one thing necessary for a school to run well is a positive relationship between the principal and the students .

Needless to say, Block has had very big shoes to fill, as a large part of Dr. Kelly's legacy is that he was a figurehead for active involvement with the student body. Every morning he was seen greeting students at the school

heard on the announcements. Everyone knew who he was and he knew everybody.

It is understandable that a principal's first year comes with many obstacles. However, many students, especially the senior class, feel that little effort has been made on his part to reach

"Maybe ASB has seen him more, but you take the average student and a lot of them don't even recognize him as an authority figure," said senior Alexis

This past year, Block has been an infrequent presence on campus. He has occasionally been seen around the school, but he is most often found in his office or the surrounding area.
"I know he's been in the

'hallways'... like outside his office, but I think that with any new principal [relations with students] are kind of a second-ary thing to come," said teacher Adam Panish.

Many students have expressed disappointment, especially members of the senior class, that Mr. Block gives the false impression that he knows the student body.

These dissenting students believe the only significant interactions that he has had with the student body have been with the Robotics Club and ASB, as well as select encounters with the senior class regarding graduation requirements.
On the subject of Block's ef-

forts to get to know the student body, teacher JuliaCheri Hoos said, "I have not witnessed any."

However, Block has acknowledged that with the students one of [his] goals coming up would be really to have better interactions and more interactions with students."

The first year as a principal is difficult at any school, especially one as unique as Malibu High. Mr. Block has clearly made his best efforts to get to know the school and make positive changes. Although certain teacher-relations have been tense and there seems to be a lapse in effort to get to know the student body, Block has shown strong interest in positive reforms for next year and proved an advocate for technology. Block hopes for nothing but good things for the school, saying "the sky is the



iving in Malibu, we are all familiar with high priced health foods and drinks. Many local businesses in our community are labeled as healthy, such as Sunlife, PC Greens, and The Vitamin Barn. The one thing in common

Basically anything healthy and organic, from cereal to TV dinners, are much more pricey than the unhealthy option. People living

tor is the cost of obtaining USDA organic certification. The process is long and definitely not chean. There is an initial fee of around \$750 and after that, the farmer has to pay for inspections to keep their organic status. In addition, the lack of chemicals used on organic products actually increases the amount of labor that is needed. Also, organically grown crops take longer to grow because conventional farms use growth hormones to unnaturally speed up the process of growth. Organic farmers have to pay the cost of growing food without using chemical shortcuts, but the result is tastier and healthier produce.

Meanwhile, organic meat and dairy products also cost way more for the farmer to produce than if they were to produce conventional products. Organic farms have much higher standards for the treatment and living conditions of the livestock. All organic livestock has to be able to have access to both pasture and indoor shelter when necessary. They are required to have room to move about and their living space must fit the needs of the animal.

This explains the higher prices of organic produce, dairy, and meat products, but does not quite justify the ten-dollar juices. Healthy eating is a big "trend" right now, and companies selling little rawvegan cookies or pressed juices charge more because they know they can due to high demand.

It's up to the customer to decide whether or not to go the pricier route, knowing that what they are paying for truly is better for them, or to just stick with the cheaper conventional foods.

Lakers' promise ends in playoff failure



"I am proud of the team and how far they have all come, while it was disappointing to see many of the seniors quit in the final few


