Deadly Landslide Hits Snohomish, WA

ifteen million cubic yards of earth slid onto the town of Snohomish, Washington midmorning Saturday, March 22. The mudslide lasted only a matter of seconds, but left over a square mile of debris in its wake.

Although the official death toll remains at 27 individuals, the unofficial death toll will likely exceed 30. Currently, 18 people are technically missing in Snohomish County, a promising decline from the 176 missing individuals reported just after the incident.

Located only 50 miles northeast of Seattle, Snohomish County first experienced several weeks of intense rain. Scientific reports suggest that the mountain above the town could not bear the weight of the moist, heavy soil, and therefore slid.

Robin Youngblood, a Snohomish resident, told CBS News that she was home with a friend during the mudslide. "We were moving, it was like we were underwater. We were under mud," Youngblood said. "We had mud in our eyes, hair, nose, and mouth."

The slide occurred at around 11 A.M. Saturday without warning. The residents of Snohomish were given no notice or alarm to evacuate the area. Approximately 49 occupied residences were in the mudslide's path at the time of impact.

"Nothing was stable to stand on," Youngblood said, recalling

the moment a 25-foot wall of mud burst into her home. Luckily, she was able to communicate with her friend when the mud hit. "I kept yelling at her to dig herself out," said Youngblood, "even if it hurt.'

The National Association for Search and Rescue continues to search for the missing individuals. Since the slide, rescue missions have been a community effort, involving dogs, ground-penetrating radars, aircrafts, shovels, and the Snohomish locals.

Search and Rescue officials stated that the slide remains a rescue operation, but that the chances of finding anyone still alive are disappearing. Travis Hots, a local fireman in Snohomish told the New York Times that the missions "have not found anybody alive...since Saturday."

Rescue missions are having difficulty searching for slide victims and missing bodies because certain areas of the debris field are dangerous. Snohomish's demolished buildings and landscape are littered with mud and toxic chemicals. "It can take five minutes to go only a few feet in some places," said Hots.

The mudslide dammed the Stillaguamish River, which caused severe flooding and pooling. The mud and debris are piled up to 25 feet deep, making it difficult for search dogs to locate the remaining missing bodies. The dogs indicated that there may be more human remains underwater. Rescuers intend to drain these areas in the following week.

Changes to the SAT

n March 5, the *College Board* announced major alterations to the SAT, the biggest since 2005. These changes will take effect in 2016.

First, the SAT will go through significant general changes. While today all students take the exam on paper, the Juniors of 2016 will be able to take a digital form of the test.

The scoring for the test will return to the 1600 scale. The previously implemented 2400 scale of 2005 will be eliminated.

Today, students are penalized ¼ of a point for wrong answers. The new SAT will not deduct any points for incorrect answers. This will allow students to guess freely on the exam.

The infamous section one essay of the SAT will be made optional rather than mandatory. Specific universities may or may not require this essay for admission. This new essay will come with a new scoring rubric as well. This rubric will likely be released in the next few months or so.

Because of this optional essay, the exam will be shorter. The previously 3-hour and 45-minute test will be reduced to 3 hours excluding the optional 50-minute essay.

There are also more specific changes to the official sections of the SAT. In the math section, calculators will be limited in usage. While previously calculators were allowed in every math section, now specific sections will be deemed "no-calculator" sections.

In the reading section, modifications will be made to the types of questions asked.

"Students will be asked to support answers with evidence, including questions that require them to cite a specific part of a passage to support their answer choice," said the *College Board*.

Students will also be required to read and work with a passage from non-fiction works such as the Declaration of Independence, the Gettysburg Address, and other historical American documents.

Likely one of the most famous studying obstacles of high school students is the SAT vocabulary. The new exam will be free of so many extraneous vocabulary words.

New vocabulary words will be those that are often used in college and careers.

There are many reasons that the *College Board* may have decided to alter the SAT.

The first reason is the rising popularity of the ACT. More students opted for the ACT than for the SAT in 2012.

Another possibility is that the *College Board* wishes to relate students' SAT studying more directly to their schoolwork. By eliminating obscure vocabulary and conducting evidence-based questions, the *College Board* may achieve this.

Many make solid careers out of tutoring high school students for the SAT. Large corporations such as *Eureka* and *Wheeler Test Prep* provide these tutors professionally

"It will probably be easier for kids in the future to do better on the test. Right now people spend so much money on tutors to teach them exactly what do to. The new test will hopefully focus on more things we've learned," said Junior Gracie Pierson.

"I'm jealous that my brother will probably have to study less than I do," said Junior **Kayla Kamen**.

On the other hand, those who will actually be affected by these changes also have comments about the new exam.

"I think it's unfair that older kids will have had tutors who knew exactly what the tricks of the test were and we won't," said Freshman **Farah Stack**.

The *College Board* hopes that these changes will have a positive effect on students and the process of college admissions in general. The Juniors of 2016 may or may not have something to look forward to, depending on how they look at it.

ARCH – With nearly 100,000 Russian troops at its border, and an illegal referendum that according to Russia puts Crimea under its sovereignty, the provisional government of Ukraine is faced with much more than just holding elections and writing government reforms.

What began as "Our Western"

What began as brigades of masked "Crimean" local militia appearing near Ukraine's Russian border, has turned to a seizure of Ukrainian military assets on the peninsula by Russian forces. This includes the takeover of Ukranian military bases and

51 Ukrainian Naval ships.

Although President Barack Obama and a number of other nations have passed numerous economic sanctions to punish Moscow, these have been countered by Russian counter-sanctions on a number of officials in NATO-allied countries. These sanctions have affected the Russian economy, but not nearly enough to make Russia back away from aggression.

Fears of internal strife in Ukraine are common in the country. Although nearly all Ukranians share a dream of a fully automonous, independent Ukraine, many groups envision different

versions of that dream, some with very nationalistic and extremely right-wing visions. On March 27th, the right wing showed its ambition by storming Verhovna Rada, Ukraine's parliament building

A referendum in Crimea has illegally made it part of Russia in a move that many question the legitimacy of.

Putin has justified his actions in a skewed fashion, comparing the situation to the United States intervention in Kosovo during the Yugoslav Civil War.

"Our Western partners, created the Kosovo precedent with their own hands. In a situation absolutely the same as the

one in Crimea they recognized Kosovo's secession from Serbia legitimate while arguing that no permission from a country's central authority for a unilateral declaration of independence is necessary" said Putin.

There are, however, many differences between the situation in Crimea and the one that occurred in Kosovo in the 90s. For instance the ethnic cleansing enacted by the Serbs on Kosovo's muslim population was widely reported by credible news sources. Russia still has yet to find one specific instance in which Russian-speakers in Ukraine have been even remotely against the uprising.

Venezuelan Chaos

he people of Venezuela have begun a series of violent protests to get the government to cease price regulation and reduce criminal violence. This began in January 2014 and the government has been against it from the start.

Protesters are being killed and injured for arguing with the government, yet they continue to protest. So far over 31 people have been killed in the protests and many more have been injured.

The protesters originally had started more peaceful protests last year trying to get what they want, but because that never worked they resorted to more violent methods earlier this year. In an interview with a mass of reporters earlier this year a congresswoman from Venezuela, Ms. Machado, said, "They are afraid of the truth. They don't want the truth to come out about the massive repression taking place in Venezuela. They don't want it to be known in the world and in our America."

When the Venezuelan Government was discussing whether or not to vote on the issues, Ms. Machado was not allowed to

speak and all media access was denied in the deliberation.

Harrison White, Junior at Malibu High School, said, "What? There are riots?"

The protests have not only had negative effects on the people of Venezuela but also on the government. As a result of protests, there are sure to be economic implications, as the government is not only trying to contain and pay for the damages that the protests have caused, but it is also being looked at from a negative light by the rest of the United Nations.

Both sides have mentioned peace talks and want to end the violence, yet neither side is willing to give in to any of the other's demands

Most students are aware of the protests in Ukraine, but have not been exposed to the atrocities occurring in Venezuela. When asked why they thought the protests were so under the radar, Junior Max Ney said, "I think its terrible that the government and publicity companies hide things they want to hide and overly publicize what they want to overly publicize. I don't know why they would want to hide these, but they shouldn't do that."

Laura Rosenthal:

he Malaysian Airline flight 370 mysteriously disappeared after its departure March 8, at 12:41 am. The days following were filled with news coverage across the world with theories and speculation. The situation is left up to interpretation on what happened to this plane and how.

The flight was on its way to Beijing from Malaysia. The last words from the co-pilot Fariq Abdul Hamid were "All right, good night." At 1:19 a.m.

After reaching a cruising altitude and speed, the plane transponder signal and all communication from the plane suddenly ceased while flying off the Gulf of Thailand. When the plane did not land at its destination, multiple nations began searching for the plane.

On March 11 it was discovered that the plane had made a sharp turn and flew back over the Malaysian Peninsula. This caused countries to extend their searches to Sout East Asia.

With still no knowledge on the whereabouts of the plane a plethora of theories emerged, including the plane's disinegration, a terrorist attack, and even a black hole. More than one of the theories seem to be legitimate but others appear to be pretty ill advised. It was also known that two of the passengers boarded the plane with stolen passports.

Word began to come out that although communications were shutdown, the engine sent off weak signals for seven hours.

On the 18th of March about 24 countries were searching or helping with the search for the plane.

On March 20th, satellite images showed what was some aircraft debris in the Southern Indian Ocean southwest of Australia.

On March 25th, some aircraft debris was found in Australia. The debris was identified as debris from flight 370 by the Malaysian government but not enough information has been released to prove that the debris is, in fact, from the flight. In a statement given by the former Homeland Security Secretary Michael Chertoff said, "It could be pilots. It could be members of the crew. We've seen a variation of that with Snowden." A couple of Malibu High School

students gave their thoughts on

the matter. Vincent Hannley, Junior and aspiring Councilman, said, "I think the plane disintegrated somehow."

However, much uncertainty mains as to the cause of the plane's disappearance. Michael Kay, a former British pilot and military officer,

said, "We don't have enough evidence to take (hijacking, sabotage or many other possibilities) off the table... What we need to do is keep an open mind, look at the facts, and keep building the jigsaw puzzle. Because that's all we have at the moment."

So far, no confirmed debris from flight 370 has been found, but officials from many countries have not stopped searching and do not plan on doing so.

"All doors and all possibilities, in my mind, are still open," said former Director of National Intelligence John Negroponte. Feelings of hope are still felt in regards to the situation and prayers are being sent by people all around the world.

The exact whereabouts of the plane is still unknown, but officials have released satements assuming that the passengers deceased.

peration Smile is an international charity dedicated to providing professional medical care to people born with a cleft lip, cleft palate, or other facial de-

formity. In some placthese children are ostracized from their communities and live in complete isolation. Operation Smile provides these children with the surgeries they need in order to be able to live their lives to the fullest and to be

happy. Living with a cleft lip or palate is not only a social disadvantage, but it also often makes it hard for the child to eat or drink.

Malibu High School students have been involved with *Operation Smile* for many years. Every year, at least one student gets the chance to actually go on a mission with the *Operation Smile* team to a country in need. Two of Malibu High's current seniors had the opportunity to do this and are both in complete agreement that it was a life-changing experience.

his mother in a village. He doesn't even speak Spanish, only the native language. He has been kept in complete isolation all his life because of his deformity. The first day that I met him he isolated himself from all the other patients even though they were all just like him. He sat in the corner with his arms crossed and didn't want to talk to anyone. When it was his surgery day I asked him to come play soccer with me and some local students. He's never been able to do that in his whole life. He was smiling so big the whole time. This was the first time anyone had seen him smile. How has going on a mission changed you or your views of the world?

It made me realize that even though those people have deformities you can get so used to it and it becomes so normal it's crazy. They are isolated their entire lives yet it's so easy to look past it. It came to a point where I would see a normal kid without a cleft lip or palate and it would look weird to me because I had become so used to them.

How many surgeries were done on your mission?

199 surgeries. Also we screened more people than any other mission in *Operation Smile* history. A screening is basically like a check up to see if someone is eligible to get a surgery.

Do you have anything else you would like to share?

Yes, there is actually going to be an *Op Smile* hospital opening permanently in Paraguay in around a

Pour into a large bowl, and allow to cool, stirring occasionally to break up large clumps.

elle Knox, a freshman at Duke University, North Carolina, is guaranteeing herself a post-graduate life free of crippling student loans with a rather unconventional method. She has currently acted in over a dozen adult films since the school year

Her road to stardom has not been an easy one to date. After a fellow student at Duke outed Knox as a performer, she has incited a whirlwind of controversy. Is Knox taking control of her own sexuality and getting paid for doing what she loves? Or is she being exploited?

Duke University is ranked number fifteen on the Forbes list

of America's top colleges and tuition runs at over \$40,000 per year. Knox's family was unable to pay for school and she was not eligible for a government loan. Typical student jobs could not even begin to cover the costs.

"I didn't feel like I had a lot of options," Knox said.

And sex, as they say, sells. According to Business Insider, female porn stars are paid a minimum of \$800 dollars for every scene they film. If a woman were to film one scene of a adult film a day for one week every month, she would earn an annual profit of \$84,000 and easily place herself in the 70th percentile for income in America.

Knox simply typed the phrase 'How to be a porn star' into her browser and was met with over

her with financial aid and enough money left over for small luxuries, like an iPad Mini and designer purses. However, her bubble was quickly burst by gossip from within the Greek communities at Duke. Knox said her social downfall at school stemmed from Thomas Bagley, a pledge at one of the fraternities. Bagley noticed while watching an adult video that the actress in it looked

oddly familiar. He confronted Knox and she admitted to being the woman in the video. On January 10th, Bagley revealed Knox's pornagraphic identity at a sorority rush event and by January 11th she had become the target of an online bullying campaign that spread across Twitter, Facebook, Instagram, and various campus

People felt they were justified in sending Knox countless messages that threatened physical abuse and rape. She was thought to have brought it all on herself the minute she had decided to be in an adult film.

Larry Moneta, the Vice President of Student Affairs at Duke, assured Knox that he would make her safety on campus a priority.

However, Moneta was powerless against the wave of agitators online.

'[The internet] seems like complete anarchy," he said in an interview from *The Chronicle*. "Vile comments still bubble up to the top. I like to believe that these comments represent the 5 percent and not the 95

percent. I hope they do."

Justice was served in a somewhat pomanner etic when adult film distributor, Mike Kulich,

offered Bagley \$10,000 to star in his own adult film as well as publishing his adult film preferences for the whole world to see.

"If he can shame girls for doing porn, I can shame him for watching it," said Kulich.

Bagley deserves to be exemplified as a hypocritical adult film viewer. There is an enormous double standard in our society where it is assumed that adults buy and consume adult films as a healthy part of their sexuality, but the performers are vilified for their business. It is unfair and illogical.

The internet makes it even easier to access truly disturbing archives of adult films that feature countless methods of abuse. A viewer


can indulge in a sadistic or otherwise immoral virtual experience and then go on in their daily lives. Does this make them any better then the people actually doing the actions on camera? People hide behind anonymity to dispel harsh judgments rather than examining their own motives.

However, adult films should not be the only viable option for young women strapped for cash. Knox's praise of the industry for empowering her just does not ring true. The people she is exposing herself to are not there to celebrate her personhood.

They see her as a submissive, two-dimensional figure in place simply for their own pleasure. It is clear-cut degradation. If Knox really wanted to make a statement on women's sexual freedom in our culture, she would use her role in the adult film industry to start a national dialogue instead of a way to make bank.

Uganda Punishes Homosexuality

n February 26, 2014, Americans breathed a collective sigh of relief as Governor Jan Brewer of Arizona vetoed the bill that would have allowed businesses to deny services to homosexual customers. The veto was seen as a triumph for both gay rights and human rights in general. With the heated controversy that the bill sparked, however, something of arguably much greater importance was overlooked.

Just two days earlier, on February 24, President Yoweri Museveni of Uganda signed a bill into law that makes homosexuality punishable by life in prison. Initially, the bill set the death penalty for those convicted of "aggra-

vated homosexuality," defined by repeated acts of gay sex between consenting adults, but reduced it to a mere life sentence after

international backlash. Additionally, performing gay marriages, promoting homosexuality, and failing to report gay people are now illegal under the new statute.

Museveni has made statements opposition to the law. his decision to sign the bill. "Sexual orientation is a matter of choice," said Museveni. "[Homosexuals] should rehabilitate themselves and society should assist them to do so."

Uganda has already faced con-

sequences as a result of the passage of the bill. The World Bank postponed a \$90 million loan to Uganda that was meant to im-

> prove health services. Denmark, Norway, the Netherlands, and Sweden, among other European countries, have cut financial aid to Uganda to display their

clarifying the reasoning behind Senator Chris Coons (D-DE), chair of the subcommittee on African Affairs, issued a statement calling for similar action from the United States. "America's rhetoric must now be met with action. For there to be no diplomatic or developmental consequence for the enactment of these laws would be to set a dangerous precedent for American foreign policy," said Coons.

Now the question is, what actions will Barack Obama, who has a track record of verbally supporting both human rights and gay rights, take against Uganda?

"As a country and a people, the United States has consistently stood for the protection of fundamental freedoms and universal human rights," said Obama on February 16, 2014. (It seems he forgot to mention the internment of Japanese Americans during World War II and the denial of the Rwandan genocide, but that's be-

side the point.)

Obama has also made several statements supporting gay rights and gay marriage, including one in response to the Russian anti-gay laws enacted before the Olympics.

He expressed that he had "No patience for countries that try to treat gays or lesbians or transgendered persons in ways that intimidate them or are harmful to them.'

On behalf of the entire Unit-States, Obama also said, "We believe that people everywhere should be treated equally, with dignity and respect, and that they should have the opportunity to reach their fullest potential, no matter who they are or whom they love." (Interestingly enough, although apparently "we" all believe in these principles, only 17 states allow gay marriage.)

So far, the only measure taken by the Obama administration has been a promise to review relations with Uganda to ensure that American anti-discrimination policies and overall values are upheld. It is clear that a path of action will not be simple - not only does the United States give over \$500 million to Uganda every year, but it also helps fund and train the Ugandan army for its resistance against the Lord's Resistance Army and al-Shabaab, a Somalian terrorist group that has been linked to al Qaeda.

In spite of complicated relations with Uganda, a president who has made gay rights a personal issue should be held to his word. If Obama wants to proclaim an unfailing devotion to ensuring basic human rights and gay rights, as he has done, he should act accordingly.

City Council Has Had E-nough

arlier this March, the LA City Council thought it wise to pass a bill ban-✓ ning the use of Vaporizers and E-Cigarettes informally known as "vapes". The bill put a stop to the popular and common use of vaporizers in most public places including clubs and bars, beaches, parks, many office buildings, restaurants, and all outdoor dining spaces within the city.

This bill was proposed following the suggested classification change, claiming that E-cigarettes should be labeled as cigarettes. However, the claim is not supported by any evidence saying that they have the same health dangers. So, what is it that they seek to ban?

The ban has brought outrage in both the "vaping" and smoking communities alike as those who are frequent vape users, for whatever reason they may have, feel as though their rights are being taken away without any sufficient reasoning. From those who do not wish to form a habit but enjoy the look, smell, and taste of vaporizers to those who are attempting to quit smoking, the ban has taken away a specific pleasure and has

no actual reasoning behind it. The nicotine used in vaporizers has shown no health effects and is believed by most to be harmless, even therapeutic for the growing amount of recovering nicotine ad-

The city passed the bill claiming that E-cigarettes will attract new smokers as they make it appear as though smoking is less harmful than previously believed. Even though the vapes have not been proven to be either harmful or harmless, the mere fact that there is no substantial evidence about the health effects on users in short-term situations and longterm situations caused the council to act cautiously in an effort to maintain the past fifty years of tobacco control the city has already done.

Ranging between seven dollars up to the infamous Shiska Sticks Sofia custom vaporizer worth around US \$7 million, vaporizers have become a fashion trend and a comfortable form of rehabilitation. Exhibiting one's own personal style, vapes have be-

come 100% customizable from mouthpiece, to cartridge, lights, button battery, and of course flavor and Even becoming as complex as different types of

vapes. "Mod" vapes use wicks instead of liquid cartridges and can produce more vapor with more potent flavors. But they require more battery voltage and more complex systems that often times have to be constructed by professionals. Vapes have become a symbol of one's own character just as a T-shirt or a pair of shoes might.

Still, the question stands as to whether or not the City Council has gone too far to stop something that has little-to-no effect and if the ban will ever be lifted. For now, it seems as though the ban will stay in place until more is known about the health risks of vapes and if the risks outweigh the advantages. In the meantime, it is still legal to "vape" in vapor lounges, e-cigarette stores, and on stage solely for theatrical purposes, whatever that might mean.

Until a case is formed against the ban, authorities will be keeping a close eye out for evidence supporting the ban such as health risks to both firsthand and secondhand users until more is known about the nicotine-optional liquid used in the cartridges or wicks of

Whether this change in scheduling will enhance our education or become detrimental to our learning, Malibu High school is in need for a change and perhaps block scheduling is that needed


Block Schedule




Were you aware that MHS was implementing block scheduling?

3. Reminisce about the nineties. I was still wearing diapers and crying myself to sleep every night in '97 so not much has changed.



uring the time when Kobe Bryant was still trying to emerge as a superstar, skipping college to play in the NBA became a normal, yet scary, trend.

During this time period, several high school basketball players were taking their skills straight to the professional league, skipping out on whatever collegiate education they were offered. It made sense for a lot of these talented players: "if I can perform and be paid in the NBA, why waste my time at a college level?"

Yet in this day and age, skipping high school has become frowned upon from an educational standpoint and now with a new NBA commissioner, **Adam Silver**, from a basketball standpoint.

The NBA had already issued the "one and done" rule, in which future NBA prospects from the United States are required to play just one full year at college before joining the NBA draft.

Baseball Coach Controversy

alibu High Varsity Baseball Assistant Coach **Phil Johnson** was fired after an incident at the Boys Varsity Baseball game against Santa Monica on Friday, March 21st.

While trying to break up an argument between players, Coach Johnson cursed at the opposing coaches who were defending their players.

A player on the Santa Monica team forcefully pushed first baseman **Kris Keech** to the ground. Keech and the Santa Monica player got into an altercation on the field, which caught the attention of the coaches.

Junior baseball player **Bronson Bard** said, "I was [on the field], some kid knocked over Kris Keech for no reason at all.

Then Phil started yelling at the other coach because they were kind of condoning it... Coach Phil got mad at them and I guess he said a bad word which kicked him out of the game."

The Santa Monica player was ejected from the game as was Coach Johnson. One of the parents on the opposing team made his/her complaints known regarding Coach Johnson's outburst and reported him to the board.

Regarding why Coach Johnson

was terminated for his actions, the official CIF Coaches Code of Ethics states that coaches must "model respectful behavior" and "refrain from the use of profanity, vulgarity, and other offensive language and gestures".

The players on the team are upset and believe the board's decision to be unfair. Senior players

on the team have approached the school board in an attempt to get Coach Johnson re-hired.

First baseman and Senior Kris Keech, who was one of the players involved in the incident, said, "[Coach Phil] said one bad thing, and he was honestly just trying to stick up for me because I didn't have any say in it and I didn't want to get kicked out of the game either. I was trying to stay quiet and he basically said 'No one's doing anything about

this, and the umpires aren't going to do anything about this'. Their coaches were saying stuff to me as well and he had my back when no one else did. I think that's awesome, as a player, and I'll play harder for him if I know he has my back."

Despite his outburst, Coach Johnson is still highly regarded by his colleagues.

"[Phil] is a phenomenal coach, and a great leader," said Head Coach **Ari Jacobs**. Jacobs had no further comment on the subject.

It is currently unknown how Coach Johnson's meeting with the board regarding his termination went

When approached for comment on Coach Johnson's current status, Malibu High School Principal **Jerry Block** said, "I can't really talk too much about it because it's an ongoing personnel matter, what I will say is Coach Phil cares deeply about the team, and the team cares deeply about him, and he puts in a lot of hours and he's very dedicated to the team, and I completely understand that."

The Junior Varsity baseball coach is going to take over assistant coaching responsibilities for the time being, with Coach Jacobs continuing on head coach. It is speculated that Coach Johnson will return after spring break, but it has not been confirmed.

It is in that last push in the latter half of the game that the few games have slipped away from them.


Expecting a fix for its simple issue, the lacrosse team has very high expectations for its season

Remembering Joan Rivers 1933 - 2014

omedy legend, famed fashion icon, worldwide celebrity, and mother Joan Rivers died at age 81 on September 5, 2014

She went into cardiac and respiratory arrest during a minor procedure at Yorkville Endoscopy on August 28. Rivers was then put on life support at Mount Sinai Hospital until her daughter, Melissa Rivers, moved her to the private Manhattan suite where she died days later.

Rivers was known for her often controversial humor, unapologetic love of plastic surgery, and scathing fashion critiques.

Rivers made her first mark on the world of comedy in 1965 as a guest on the Tonight Show with Johnny Carson.

Her appearance on the show helped to establish her comedic style and she later began her own program in 1986, The Late Night Show with Joan Rivers becoming the very first woman to have a late night talk show. She later created the Joan Rivers Show which she received a Daytime Emmy for, and ran from 1989- 1993.

low comedians from all over the country and world.

"My mother's greatest joy in life was to make people laugh. Although that is difficult to do right now, I know her final wish would be that we return to laughing soon." Joan's daughter, Melissa Rivers, said in a statement released to People Magazine shortly after her mother's passing.

Known most for her appearance on the Tonight Show with Johnny Carson, creating a Grammy nominated comedy album, launching a daytime talk show, and starring in many other shows, Rivers was passionate about what she did and expressed her love for comedy throughout her life.

"If there is a secret to being a comedian, it's just loving what you do. It is my drug of choice. I don't need real drugs. I don't need liquor. It's the joy that I get performing. That is my rush. I get it nowhere else," Rivers said.
